

# DEPARTMENTS AND TRAINING OFFERED

#### DEPARTMENT OF INTERNATIONAL LAW

The International Law Department was created with the appointment of its Head in 2005. In general, the International Law Department follows the operation of the International Litigation stream. The Department has, as permanent lecturers, Professors, Associate professors, Lecturers and Assistant lecturers.

#### **Master's degree in International Disputes**

The Master's degree in International Disputes is part of the general framework of programmes offered at IRIC, but it is specialised more on international mechanisms, institutions and procedures for the settlement of disputes relating to international law.

#### **Purpose of the Master Programme**

The ultimate aim of the Master's degree in International Disputes is to train specialists in international dispute resolution procedures, with a view to effectively defend the interests of Cameroonians and Africans. The aim is to have, in the long run, a pool of competent experts capable of competing on the local and international level. Finally, it is a question of establishing the autonomy of local expertise, avoiding the need for public and private actors to rely on costly external expertise.

The programme comprises 32 courses coupled with an internship report and a thesis. The aim of Teaching Unit 101 is to provide students with the fundamentals of International Relations. Units 102, 103 and 104 aim to deepen the students' knowledge on Public International Law and African International Law. Teaching units 105, 106, 204 aim to deepen students'

knowledge in specialized and emerging areas of International Law. Units 201, 202, 203 and 205 are devoted to the techniques of international litigation in diverse fields of International Law, and the modalities of drafting documents in international cases. Teaching Units 107, 108, 206 and 207 deal with research, language and computer skills as well as with ethical and integrity issues.

Target: The Master's degree is open to holders of a Bachelor's degree in any law speciality, professionals in the legal profession are recruited on the basis of their degree or their professional experience equivalent to a Bachelor's degree and regardless of the Common Law or French law legal system.

Remarks: In the training, a balance is sought and safeguarded between the pedagogical approaches of Common Law and Romano-Germanic Law on the one hand, and the integration of new Information and Communication Technologies training tools. In the long run, there are prospects of ushering the Master's programme to other regions, in particular the Central Africa sub-region through distance learning.

# DEPARTMENT OF INTERNATIONAL ECONOMICS

The Department comprises two streams, namely: International Banking and Finance and International Marketing.

#### **International Banking and Finance (BMFI)**

This programme has been existing since 1994. The Master's degree in BMFI is part of the government's desire to adapt its training programmes to the multidimensional nature of international relations. This course specializes on international financial markets.

Purpose of the programme: To provide learners with decision-making tools and techniques. Understand that the financial product is a «global thing»: any financing, any investment becomes a product in its own right, i.e. a negotiable security and no financial condition should be considered as immutable.

Goal of the programme: To know in detail the components of international financial markets; to exploit the internationalization of financial flows; to understand that a financing or an investment, just like a raw material necessary for the production of the company, becomes a product in its own

right, i.e. that it is the subject of a market, is stored, transformed and sold. It is subject to the same risks of depreciation and supply. In short, it must be subject to the same monitoring and the same search for optimization.

Objective of the programme: To provide trainings that are adapted to the professions of financial market and corporate treasury; To train experts in the specialities of international capital markets: international banking market, international issues market, derivatives markets, foreign exchange markets and operations, stock exchange markets and operations, banking techniques, financial risk management instruments; To have at one's disposal the tools of international payments: participation of companies in international exchanges, definition of payment methods, securing of collections and optimization of cash management.

Target: Students with a minimum of a Bachelor's degree or equivalent in Economics or Business Law Management. Workers with the required level or equivalent.

#### The International Marketing programme (MI)

Purpose of the programme: The training focuses on market and, above all, on the needs of consumers. Targets are then selected according to the company's strengths and weaknesses as well as the opportunities or threats in the market.

Goal of the programme: To provide companies or all potential users with specialists in the company-distribution-sales relationship.

Objective of the programme: To make Marketing a scientific aspect that puts the consumer's needs at the heart of the company's needs and according to orderly stages, i.e. studies, strategies, operations. The programme comprises 53 courses in addition to internship and thesis.

Target :The programme is open for students with a minimum of a Bachelor's degree or equivalent, in Economics or Management, Law or Information and Communication Sciences and Techniques, Humanities, Business School Diploma, workers with equivalent level in Law, in DSTIC and Humanities.

# DEPARTMENT OF INTERNATIONAL POLICY

#### **International Communication and Public Action**

Masters in International Communication and Public Action is part of the general framework of International Studies offered at IRIC, but it specialises in public policies and in the different strategies for their evaluation and implementation. It provides students with effective techniques and technology necessary to efficiently acquire the most appropriate tools and know-how to give meaning to the action of different actors operating at global level.

#### **Purpose of the programme**

The CAPI Master's degree opens up a range of career opportunities for its students. As an example, we can mention functions such as Head of Cooperation Services in ministries with international activities; Head of Communication in the administrations of multinational companies and





other international organisations; journalists specialising in international issues; managers of international events; Public Relations managers of major national or international programmes; or managers responsible for emergency and humanitarian issues.

The programme comprises 51 courses coupled with an internship and a thesis. The aim of Teaching Unit-TU 101 is to provide students with the fundamentals of public policy and international public action. TUs 102, 103 and 104 aim to deepen students' knowledge in the field of communication and public policy. Teaching units 105, 106, 204, mainly taught by professionals, expose students to practical realities and problems that may be specific to their field of expertise. This also applies to the third and fourth semesters.

**Target:** The Master's degree is open to holders of a Bachelor's degree in Information and Communication Technology, Law, Political Sciences, Social and Human Sciences.

- Train consultants for IGOs, development NGOs and local institutions
- -Link African states to the requirements of globalization, and prepare experts to cope with competitive nature of international relations.

**Target:** Students with a minimum of a Bachelor's degree or equivalent, in economics or management, law, political sciences, humanities and workers with the required or equivalent degree in Economics or Management.

The programme consists of 42 courses alongside an internship and a thesis.

#### LIBRARY AND MEDIA CENTER



IRIC's library is designed to meet the information needs of the students, teachers, researchers and staff, as well as the needs of outsiders whose research justifies the use of a university library.

#### **Missions**

The missions of the library are among others to: identify, select, acquire, process, preserve and evaluate information stored in various formats (books, serials, brochures, government publications, audiovisual and online resources, etc.) so as to meet the information needs of the users.

#### **Opening hours**

The Library is open to the public 7:30 a.m. and closes at 9:00 p.m. from Mondays to Fridays and Saturdays from 7:00am-3:30pm.

During vacations, the library provides a minimum service from 7:30 am to 3:30 pm on weekdays.

#### **Library collections**

IRIC has approximately: - 5,200 books,

- 394 volumes of updated collections from "The Hague Academy of International Law (1923-2016)".
- 600 Brochures
- 425 Dissertations
- 238 Theses
- 770 Internship reports

#### **Borrowing**

Students, teachers, researchers and staff who subscribe to the library are entitled to consult and borrow books and other publications. The maximum number of books an individual can borrow is four for a duration of two weeks.

#### Some guidelines to follow in the reading rooms

In order to avoid any inconvenience that could lead to expulsion from the library, users should observe the following rules:

- Do not bring bags into the library

#### **MULTIMEDIA CENTRE**



The Multimedia Center is a support unit where students and researchers can conduct research online. It has computers, equipped with a high-speed internet connection.

#### **IRIC PRESS**

The Publishing Center named "Presses de l'Institut des Relations Internationales du Cameroun-PIRIC" is a specialized structure under the directorate of IRIC. Created in June 2020, its primary objective is to produce and publish the activities of the institute.

#### **CONFUCIUS INSTITUTE**

The Confucius Institute is a spring board for Sino-Cameroonian cooperation. It was created following the signing of an agreement between the National Council for the Promotion of Chinese Language (HANBAN) and the University of Yaoundé II. Since 1996, the Confucius Institute has been teaching Mandarin at IRIC, which contributes to stimulate cultural and educational exchanges as well as foster cooperation and friendship between China and Cameroon.







#### **CENTER FOR KOREAN STUDIES**

The center is fruit of the cooperation between Cameroon and Korea. the Center It was officially inaugurated on October 14, 2019 by the Ambassador of Korea in Cameroon H.E. Mrs. Bok-Ryeol RHYOU and the Rector of the University of Yaoundé II, Prof. Adolphe MINKOA SHE representing the Minister of State, Minister of Higher Education.

As highlighted by H.E. Mrs. Bok-Ryeol RHYOU, Ambassador of Korea to Cameroon, the center aims to *«stimulate understanding and cultural ties between the peoples of the Republic of Korea and the peoples of the Republic of Cameroon for a more effective cooperation between the two friendly countries.»*

#### **Teaching process at IRIC**

The outbreak of the Corona virus pandemic, Covid 19, has fundamentally changed teaching methods at IRIC. From now on, courses are taught both in person and online.

NB: It is understood that punctuality and attendance structure the discipline within the institution.



#### **Course Schedules**

It varies according to the programme as follows:

- For the classical Masters and some programmes in partnership, classes take place between 7:30 am and 8:30 pm.
  - For other Masters like the CA2D, classes run from 4:30 pm to 8:30 pm.

#### **Duration of the training**

The training lasts for 2 years in principle but exceptionally it can be extended for an additional period of time to permit students complete their thesis.

#### **Assessment**

Assessments in IRIC are conducted in the following manner:

1. Continuous assessment

Continuous assessments (lectures and homework among others) represent 30% of the student's final grade.

2. Examinations

Examinations represent 70% of student's final grade

## CONDITIONS FOR OBTAINING THE ATTESTATION OF COMPLETION OF STUDIES

At the end of the training, students must meet the following conditions to receive their certificate:

- 1. Must have regularly paid the tuition fees and copies of receipts deposited at the bursar's office and at the Directorate of Studies.
  - 2. Must have validated all the teaching units;
- 3. Must have submitted an internship report;
- 4. Must have defended a thesis at the end of the training;
- 5. Not be in possession of any library document.

#### **COOPERATION SCHOLARSHIPS**

Every year, IRIC receives offers of scholarships to allow students pursue their studies abroad. These scholarships are intended for Masters and PhD students who wish to further their research in specific fields in collaboration with other state partners or Universities.

#### **ACADEMIC INTERNSHIPS**

Candidates for academic internship sends an unstamped application to the Deputy Director of Studies (DAE) for a letter of recommendation. The student will be responsible to submit the said letter of recommendation to the requested structure.

#### **INTERNSHIP REPORTS**

After completing an internship, the student must submit the following documents to the Internship section:

- Certificate of completion of the internship (1 copy)



- Internship reports (3 copies)
- Digital version of the report (1CD)

NB: The internship report is the final step in the first year of the Master's programme.

#### ATTESTATION OF RESEARCH

To obtain an attestation of research, students are required to apply to the Deputy Director of Studies (DAE). It permits them to have access to all the structures of their choice to carry out research.

## SUBMISSION OF THESIS AND SCHEDULING OF DEFENSES

#### **Procedures:**

- Six (06) copies of the thesis accompanied by an authorization signed by the supervisor(s) and an academic profile of level 1 and 2 are submitted and registered at the Programme Monitoring, Teaching, Examination and Support Section (SPEES).
- Transmission of a copy of the thesis, authorization of deposit and the academic profiles of the Departments concerned for jury proposals.
- Approval of the Deputy Director in charge of studies and transmission to the Director for validation of the jury members.

#### **Scheduling of exams**

The scheduling of the defense is done within a minimum of fourteen (14) days from the date of validation of the juries by the Director.

# UNIVERSITY SERVICES AND EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

#### **ACCOMMODATION**

IRIC has 55 modern single rooms for diplomatic and protocol interns and students. Priority is given to foreign diplomatic trainees. The University of Yaoundé II also allocates rooms for IRIC students on its site at Ngoa-Ekellé. The following conditions must be met:

- A formal request addressed to the Director of IRIC
- A duly completed application form to be collected from the Bursar's Office
- A certificate of residence of the parents for the nationals
- Four 4 × 4 passport photos
- A photocopy of the receipts of payment of complete tuition fees for the current year
- A medical certificate issued by IRIC's infirmary
- A copy of birth certificate

#### For disabled students (in addition)

- A certificate of disability
- A copy of the disability card
- A full photo (showing the disability).

#### Rent and terms of payment:

The following amounts are charged:

- Campus housing for national students and students from the CEMAC zone: 10,000FCFA /month
- Accommodation within the campus for diplomatic trainees and foreign



#### workers 20.000FCFA/month

- The duration for accommodation is 2 years. However, students can benefit from an extension in case of force majeure duly authorised by the Administration (the extension goes from 01 to 12 months and cannot exceed one year). The mandate ends if the student finishes his training before the deadline;
- The conditions of allocation are contained in a form to be withdrawn at the Bursar's Office;
- The beneficiary (student) has two (02) weeks for the payment of the related fees to take possession of the room. After this period, he/she will be replaced by those on the waiting list. To this end, he/she will have to pay 12 months of advance payment equivalent to a sum of 120,000 FCFA and a deposit of 50,000 FCFA, for a total of 170,000 FCFA.
- The trainees will have to pay a sum of 20.000 FCFA  $\times$  9 = 180.000 FCFA.
- Finally, the beneficiary will have to fill out a room condition sheet to be collected at the Bursar's Office.

NB: payments are made only at the bank after issuance of a discharge by IRIC's Bursar.

#### **MEASURES TO BE TAKEN**

Before any payment is made, a receipt must be obtained from the Bursar's Office;

- The payment of fees is done only at the bank and the copy of the receipt sent to the administration. Except for certification and duplication fees which are paid at the IRIC's accounting office.
- A photocopy of the receipt of payment of the fees is deposited at the Bursar's Office and another one at the department concerned;

NB: The housing within the campus is allocated by a commission chaired by the Director of IRIC, after examination of the applications of students and trainees.

- The beneficiary (student) has two (02) weeks for payment of fees to take possession of the room. Failure to comply, he/she will be replaced by those on the waiting list. For this purpose, he/she will have to pay 12 months of advance payment equivalent to a sum of 120.000 FCFA and a deposit of 50.000 FCFA, for a total of 170.000 FCFA.
- The trainees will have to pay a sum of 20.000 FCFA  $\times$  9 = 180.000 FCFA.
- An inventory of the premises will be carried out before the keys are handed over.

For residents, arrangements can be made for evening meals. The dishes offered are specialties from Cameroon, Africa and even other continents. Menus are posted every morning on the restaurant's bulletin board.

In addition to the in-house kitchen, the restaurant also has a catering service and an air-conditioned room with a modern bar.

#### **INFIRMERIE**

The IRIC infirmary includes: A doctor's office, two nurses' offices, an observation room with two beds, a pharmacy, a laboratory and two toilets.

The nurses welcome students for any reason affecting their health, including relational or psychological reasons. They liaise with the family and the educational team.

The nurses welcome students preferably outside of school hours, in order to ensure the smooth running of their education. Only those with a medical problem that cannot wait until the end of class will go to the infirmary.

Students are invited to inform IRIC medical staff of their health history.

In the event of an emergency (illness or accident), IRIC has an emergency protocol. In case of illness or accident, the student will be taken care of free of charge by the infirmary.

#### **ASSOCIATION AND CLUB ACTIVITIES**

The community life takes place within the cultural clubs and associations of various programmes headed by ASSESIRIC (Association of Students and Diplomatic Trainees of IRIC).

#### **Cultural clubs**

At the beginning of each academic year, the Director of IRIC signs the list of clubs authorized to operate for the current year. The clubs authorized to operate for the current year are the following: Protocol and Hostess Club, Choir Club (internationalists' choir), Commonwealth Club, African Union Club, Red Cross Club, CEMAC Club, UNESCO Club.

#### **Student Associations**

Apart from ASSESIRIC, training courses are constituted in Associations. There are a total of 9 (nine) student associations: banking, litigation, diplomacy, marketing, IRMIC, CA2D, CAPI, Senghor chair and ICESCO chair.

#### **SPORTING ACTIVITIES**

The practice of sports is common and compulsory at IRIC to enable students to relax from the intense academic activity.

Within this framework sports animation take place on campus and students from all levels and departments compete in handball and soccer competitions called the Director's Cup.

#### **CULTURAL ACTIVITIES**

IRIC actively participates in national and cultural events. In particular, the Youth Day, National Day, International Women's Day and Labour Day.

In like manner, student associations and the administration regularly organize events of cultural character.





#### **GUIDED TOURS**

It allows the acquisition, clarification, exchange or reinforcement of knowledge. It favors direct observation of situations or people and stimulates personal integration. It is essentially part of the professional discovery programs. The goal is to understand the functioning of an administration, a company and its different services. It is also an opportunity for learners to get to know the professions.

#### **STUDY TRIPS**

As part of its policy to blend theory with practice, each year IRIC organizes study tours, these trips consist of a series of field visits that relates to a specific global theme. This immersion in the professional world facilitates the practical understanding of the courses.



# DUTIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF THE STUDENT

#### **REGULATORY PROVISIONS**

Pursuant to Order No. 08/0249/MINESUP of September 11, 2008, on the common status of students of public universities and institutions in Cameroon

The obligations of student are in the strict observance of the texts governing studies and behaviour within University Institutions. According to the text:

- Each student is obliged to pay the fees of participation for his/her training and comply with registration formalities in force;
- Each student is bound by the obligation of discipline (Cf. IRIC's internal regulations).

#### **DRESSING CODE**

No non-conforming attire is allowed on campus.

#### **WOMEN**

- Suit with pants or skirt
- Dresses must be knee length
- Traditional formal wear
- Uniform hairstyle, no extravagant colours (yellow, blue, red, etc.)
- Shoes with heels, they should not exceed 8 cm in height
- Low closed shoes



#### MEN

- A two piece or three piece jacket, preferably in dark colours
- A half-season jacket, i.e. the jacket and pants do not necessarily have to be the same colour.
- The simple bird's outfit (Pants and shirt with tie)
- Traditional ceremonial outfit (e.g. Gandoura)
- A pair of closed shoes with socks
